

It's the size of a U.S. Silver Dollar. The price of the medallions include a multi-color certificate with the Lodge's name, the Honoree's name, and includes shipping and handlings. The Junior Order is alive and well! Five new Chapters were formed within the Supreme Domain. Thanks to all the Pythians that help start these new Chapters! During the Supreme Council meeting, changes to the By-Laws for the Junior Order were enacted. Look for the changes to aid greatly in the ease of formation of new Chapters.

Thank you all, very much!



Pythian Web-site Promotes the Order

In the 8½ years since it went on-line in December of 1995, the Knights of Pythias Web-site at http://www.pythias.org has attracted over 150,000 visitors. While this is not a huge number compared to some sites which have millions of visitors per day, it is a significant number in that it has brought increased visibility to the Order, has attracted new brothers, and enabled us to improve communication to and between our members.

The website serves two purposes; promoting the Order to nonmembers, and providing interactive services for our members. On the web-site, visitors can read about the history of our order, and its founder, Justus Rathbone. They can request further information on becoming a member, or can ask a question to be answered by the Supreme Secretary. Members can access clipart for use by their Lodges, sign up for the mailing list, and now they can even download the most recent copy of the "Pythian International Magazine," and view the Pythian jewelry catalog. Another page has a directory to all known Grand Lodge and Subordinate Lodge web-sites.

Use of the website by Brothers and visitors continues to grow. For instance, we instituted a page to request certificates for our presentations to Eagle Scouts, and since February, 2001, we have received over 1000 requests for those certificates. The use of our Clipart page as resource is also growing, but could become more useful if we had more clipart to share. Please submit any clipart that you have to share, in electronic form, to webmaster@pythias.org.

A side benefit of our website hosting is the available feature of "forwarding" addresses using "pythias.org." You may now contact the Supreme Chancellor at: **supremechancellor@pythias.org**, the Supreme Secretary at: supremesecretary@pythias.org, the Supreme Treasurer at: **supremetreasurer@pythias.org**, the Supreme Chief at: supremechief@pythias.org, and the Editor, Michael Jay Burke, of the "Pythian International Magazine" may be reached anytime at: PI@pythias.org. Other forwarding addresses, for official reasons, may be requested from the webmaster.

We have been developing a new service for the specific benefit of Subordinate Lodge Secretaries. To make their job easier, there is a new page on the website which has access to several of the forms in Adobe PDF^a format, because it can become tedious to find and fill out some of the Supreme Lodge required forms. These forms can be displayed via the free Adobe Acrobat^a reader. The forms can then be filled in on-the-screen, then printed out to be signed, sealed, and delivered to Supreme for immediate filing. This area of the website is password-protected. In order to obtain access, a Lodge Secretary must send a request to: webmaster@pythias.org stating his full name, Lodge name and location, and email address. The Secretary's email address must also be "registered" on the Pythian web-site's "Pythian Brothers Mailing List" page. I will set up a password and send the URL to any legitimate Secretary who requests one.

PACDGC Fred Milman maintains the "Pythian Brothers Mailing" List" where almost 800 Brothers have signed up to participate in the exchange of information pertinent to the Order. To sign up for this service, go to the website and select the button for the mailing list. There can be quite a bit of "traffic" at times and some Brothers have complained that they get too many messages from the list. In these cases we suggest that you may wish to change your subscription to "Digest" mode. If you do not know the message process very well of Yahoogroups.com, in order to make this change yourself, once you are a member of the list, send an email to pythlist@pythias.org and we will promptly get the changes made for you.

We are always open to suggestions to improve the web-site and to add new and exciting content. The website can only be as good as the information it presents.

With the addition of the "Pythian International Magazine" to the site, it has made it even more valuable as a recruiting tool, where you can refer potential new members so that they can learn more about our many different facets, goals and ethical structure!

My grandson (*Joe LeBlank*), who lives in Moncton, NB, has a 3 year old daughter (*Corilyn*) with cerebral palsy. On the 2nd of December, 1996, Support GP asked if we could help him.

On December 20th his wife and daughter were to be flown to the Montreal Shriners hospital, for assessment and treatment for the child. The flight was to leave Moncton early in the morning and return late that night, and the Shriners were covering all cost for the wife and child, but not the father.

Although he was also needed to help look after his daughter, the cost of a return flight was \$663 03, which had to be confirmed by midnight December 17th. So, I got on the phone and started calling and looking for information on the cerebral palsy fund. Contact was made with GC Arlie Fraser, PGC Brian McGuire, and Supreme Inner Guard Ron Dickinson. From them, I was led to Sister Betty Porter, but she only looked after Cerebral Palsy of Nova Scotia!

Four days later I was in Fredericton, New Brunswick, and I visited Fredericton Lodge #6. Grand Inner Guard, Brother Les Boyle, from Oxford lodge #26, was making his official visit, and after Lodge Les said he would help all he could.

On returning home, Mrs. Giselle Pitts, Cerebral Palsy of NB called me, and after hearing my story, knowing I was a member of Knights of Pythians,

she told me that it normally took quite some time after the forms were filled out before approval was given.

I had the money! She guaranteed it! She stated that the board did not meet until the following Tuesday but since time was short to go ahead and confirm his flight. She would send the cheque and the papers, by courier! She did as she promised, and I had everything by Wednesday afternoon.

In the mean time, Brother Les Boyle contacted Sister Mabel Lowther, who were all working on my behalf. The help received, and the speed in which it was accomplished proved to me that the principles of the order, friendship, charity, and benevolence, are alive and well and Mrs. Pills said (when I thanked her) "it is pay back time" for all the knights and Sisters work done for Cerebral Palsy.

History of a Pythian Sister

Ten years ago, I wrote, as a newly installed Supreme Officer an article entitled "Ode to a Pythian Sister." It was intended as a tribute to my mother, who passed from this world six days after I was installed as Supreme Guard.

It is to my mother that I attribute my love for fraternal work after she encouraged me at the age of eleven to join a junior fraternal order. And so, when, a year after my marriage, I was invited (by my mother-in-law) to become a Pythian Sister, I responded unhesitating. And so it began.

When looking back on the last forty-eight years of my Pythian history and my life, it seems that there were always two distinct markers -- the birth of another child or a new role as a Pythian Sister.

I remember so well becoming Most Excellent Chief for the first time of my subordinate temple in 1961 and looking upon an audience of women -- my mentors -- so skilled and knowledgeable in the Order. (An audience, which occasionally, would include a visitor by the name of Bertha Lynn, who would become the second Past Supreme Chief of Michigan.) These women enhanced my love of ritualistic work by exhibiting it perfectly. They also taught me about devoted service to one's community, family, and the Pythian Order. (They even taught me as a young wife and mother, how to peel potatoes properly; make a meatloaf; and, wash dishes without using an abundance of soap!)

In 1980, when I became Grand Guard of Michigan, I thought that surely I had reached the epitome of my Pythian history. But, again, new mentors informed me that I had just begun to learn of Purity, Love, Equality, and Fidelity.

When, in 1985, I was installed as Grand Chief of Michigan, (same husband plus six children) I wondered what good fortune had brought me to this place. By this time, I did know how to properly peel potatoes, make meatloaf, and wash dishes with a minimum of soap!

I have always been so proud of being a Pythian Sister. We are an Order that takes so little and gives so much yet, so many times we forget to show our worth to the world.

We feel that young women today are too busy to join an Order that believes in Love for each other; Equality for all people; Fidelity to our families, our friends, our country, and our Order; and the Purity of spirit which will surely allow us to exist for at least another 115 years.

When I was installed as Supreme Chief in 2202, I realized that even after all these years I had much to learn and my sisters have helped me learn. My visits have been labors of love and I have been treated with kindness, respect, sisterly love, and, best of all, many - many - hugs!

You have honored me by allowing me to be your Supreme Chief and I look forward to our Supreme Sessions in August where together we will formulate the future.

Is my history unique? Surely not, as I have heard throughout my travels some wonderful Pythian histories. But never forget that we are continuing to write our Pythian history now!

And this writer's Pythian history will hopefully continue long after I pass the Bible to my successor. My Pythian sisters will teach me and I will continue to learn.

You will, each and everyone, live in my memory "until the lights go out."

Before I realized what was happening, I was standing in front of my Grand Temple Sisters receiving my "White Bible!" - A gift from my Grand Temple Officers!


The feelings were truly overwhelming!





The next morning, Carlie woke me with a knock on the door, and when I said "come in" she was carrying a **massive** tray filled with every kind of breakfast food that is made on this planet, and a quart of milk!

After I ate, bathed and dressed, I emerged to find Joshua waiting for me with a couple of fishing poles. 

ather's Day, contrary to popular misconception, was not established as a holiday in order to help greeting card manufacturers sell more cards. In fact when a "father's day" was first proposed there were no Father's Day cards! Sonora Dodd, of Washington, first proposed the idea of a "father's day" in 1909.

Dodd was inspired with the idea of Father's Day while listening to a Mother's Day sermon, at church. She wanted a special day to honor her father, William Smart.

William Smart, a Civil War veteran, was widowed when his wife (*Mrs. Dodd's mother*) died in childbirth, with their sixth child. Mr. Smart was left to raise the newborn and his other five children by himself on a rural farm in eastern Washington state.

It was after Mrs. Dodd became an adult that she realized the strength and selflessness her father had shown in raising his children as a single parent.

The first Father's Day was observed on June 19, 1910 in Spokane, Washington. At about the same time in various towns and cities across America, other people were beginning to celebrate a "father's day."

In 1926 President Calvin Coolidge supported the idea of a national father's day. Finally, in 1966, President Lyndon Johnson signed a "Presidential Proclamation" declaring the 3rd Sunday of June as Father's Day.

It has since been adopted by Canada, parts of Europe and several other countries. Father's Day has become a day to not only honor your father, but all men who act as a father figure. Stepfathers, uncles, grandfathers, and adult male friends are all to be honored on Father's Day.

We would always celebrate each deposit by stopping for an ice cream cone. I always got chocolate. Dad always got vanilla. When the clerk at the ice cream parlor handed Dad his change, he would show me the few coins nestled in his palm. "When we get home, we'll start filling the jar again." He always let me drop the first coins

into the empty jar. As they rattled around with a brief, happy jingle, we grinned at each other. "You'll get to college on pennies, nickels, dimes and quarters," he said. "But you'll get there. I'll see to that."

The years passed, and I finished college and took a job in another town. Once, while visiting my parents, I used the phone in their bedroom, and noticed that the pickle jar was gone. It had served its purpose and had been removed. A lump rose in my throat as I stared at the spot beside the dresser where the jar had stood. My dad was a man of few words, and never lectured me the values of determination, perseverance, and faith. The pickle jar had taught me all these virtues far more eloquently than the most flowery of words could have done. When I married, I told my husband Jeff about the significant part the lowly pickle jar had played in my life as a girl.



1904 - ONE HUNDRED YEARS LATER - 2004

THE KP BUILDING - a historical landmark in Rockwood, TN is a two

story red brick and block building that today houses Oak Leaf #49 Lodge in the top story with a barber shop and a storage warehouse on the ground floor. With to foot thick walls and over 40 feet high, this has been the home of Oak Leaf Lodge for 100 years of its 116 year history.



At the beginning only one side was built with the

other side completed several years later with a 27 step staircase to the top Lodge floor. From the humble beginnings with wood and coal stove and no air conditioning, it grew over the years to incorporate a chair-lift, television, a Pythian Historical Museum room, Grand Secretary's Office, with ample lodge meeting space, a big recreation room and a nice kitchen area.

Early on, the local Masons also met at the KP building. It even housed the local school while they were in transition to a larger building.



The Oak Leaf Chapter of the Junior Order of Knights of Pythias met there from 1950 to the 1970's. The Pythian Sisters have met in the building at two different time periods and El Teva Temple DOKK also used the space. The first floor has been used to house such diverse businesses as a gas station, The Rockwood Times - the local area newspaper, lawyer's offices, TV Sales, and Barber and Beauty Shops.

During the early 1900's the Lodge had a Uniform Rank Team and it was very common to see the horses tied out in front of the lodge building. In 1990 the KP building was declared a Historical Site by the Tennessee Historical Commission. During 2000 - 2002 it was home to then Supreme Chancellor Bobby Crowe (our first and only one)!

The KP Building . . . a valued and still functional landmark in this friendly Community of 5000 people... Value and preserve our past for the sake of our future!

It always amazes me what some Americans think about different countries, even ones as close to us as Canada!



The new "Pythian International Magazine" has united Canadian Brothers and Sisters as never before, enabling them stand up and be counted and to be heard in their very own section of the magazine. I believe that the new PI will become a fantastic recruiting tool for the future! With just one issue Pythians have been inspired to ask others to join! Stories of universal interest and the shear quality of the publication brings our Order into the 21st Century. I am also very impressed with Michael's talent in picture editing especially in doing the impossible ... In the last issue, Helen Thomas, wife of Preston, DOKK Coordination, had a bra strap showing and was wearing an oxygen breather ... Michael said "No one of that generation would be caught dead looking like that in an International magazine!" So, he cleaned that all up, took off her Oxygen tubes, and gave her makeup, making her look 10 years younger! Wow!

Our new Editor is asking for moving, emotional action and human-interest stories and photos instead of "award shots" that can be printed in our local Pythian papers.

At Grand Convention we were informed that Lodges and Temples have raised more than \$20,000 to give to local Cerebral Palsy centers. The guest speaker talked about horse therapy helping children with cerebral palsy. Children and horses form incredible bonds. Children having little initial coordination may actually improve their riding to competition levels. Pythians were asked to volunteer their time in this project by helping in offices, grooming horses or by transporting children.

The new Grand Chancellor, Tim McNaughton, focused on going back to basics. He emphasized using the Grand and Subordinate Manuals and the old methods of rank work wherever possible. He stressed "memory" work. GC McNaughton asked members to keep him informed through phone calls. Grand Lodge officers must submit their work to the local Pythian record and "Pythian International Magazine."

GC McNaughton wants more interaction with the Pythian Sisters wherever possible. Regrouping is needed to gain new members. The Lodges must be recognizing their older members for their experience in Pythian pride. Lodges should be much more involved in their local communities and in publicizing their activities.

GC McNaughton asked, "How do the new Pythians view the world of Pythianism and what do they expect? What do they want and need?" He wants Lodge Deputies to bring these ideas from their Lodges to be discussed at the District Meetings and taken on to Grand Council for consideration.

Lodges that are single and independent are the hardest hit for new membership because their ideas are stale. Some kind of greater communication should be available. GC McNaughton suggested flyers, brochures, web sites and magazines.

Long-range plans should include timing and location for points of availability, support and how to activate projects for the Lodges. Signage or kits for the Lodges are necessary, so we can know what is going on. For example if a parade is the project, then responsibility should be delegated so all can come together. Experienced Pythians are available on all levels of membership - Lodge, District Deputies or Grand Officers.

We all have to be available to help! We are the Team and the buck stops here. We have to be flexible, make room for new ideas and must set standards for accepting new ideas. This gives the new Pythian a chance to be part of the "Team" so he won't lose interest.

We want the new members to feel welcome. We want to make a good impression on new members. We only get one chance to make that all-important first impression. We must make sure our Lodges are in order by starting our meetings on time and by having planned activities. Once a new Brother has a bad experience, he will tell others and everyone loses.

Outdated ideas hinder recruiting. We sit around and wonder why no one wants to join. We must focus on being accountable and responsible.

To be able to serve the Lodge and Community, our first step should be to sit down and discuss these issues among the members. Next we need to be honest about what we can and cannot influence. We need to be open to the new ideas that we bring in as a Pythian group. We need to be very demanding and self-aware in being good Pythians. We often need to question and review whether we have the right information and whether we understand what Pythianism is all about. Then we will be able to recruit new members!

We had 10 people come together to meet Michael (the Editor of this magazine) for breakfast when he came to Canada to set up the mailing system for us. Bob, Mark, Leo, Trish, Ray & Erana, Peggy & Ruby and Jane & me.

On Saturday we went to the Wheelchair Hockey team practice session to hand-distribute some of the new Pythian magazines. Michael took about 87 pictures (*some are shown above*.). I find that it is rather unbelievable that the new PI has only been out for two issues, because the visible, tangible results have been so profound and so positive, and the quality of the magazine is so good already, that it seems that it must have been in production for years!

THE PYTHIAN HALL of HONORS

Have you ever thought about what happens to the lives of individuals, families or groups of people who are caught up in a trauma situation due to an accident, death by murder, death by fire, death by an auto accident or by an explosion?

These are just some of the examples that an elite group of people known as the Trauma Intervention Program (*TIP*) members care about.

TIP was started in California and is now in 10 states including Nevada. It is totally a volunteer program. The members are given a tough training program to teach them how to cope with the above situations and offer their assistance in helping with the traumas involved.

One such member is our Lodge Brother Larry Singer, who is also the Lodge Inner



Guard. He serves 36 hours per month and is on call 24/7 by means of a beeper.

To do this stressful job you have to have a responsible attitude and compassion for those who are in a state of trauma.

Larry is new to the program and already he has been in several intensely emotional situations involving murder, accident and fire.

Each experience that he handles is followed up with a written report, and by his supervisor, to check up on Larry as to his mental state of mind. Clark County Lodge #96 in Las Vegas Nevada is proud of what Larry is doing for the City of Las Vegas. The Police and Fire fighters appreciate the work that TIP is doing and is always looking for more volunteers to add to the present roster.

William Z. Todd

William Z. (Bill) Todd, 83, of Allen passed away Saturday April 10, 2004. He was born October 13, 1920. He graduated from Allen High School in 1938. He was Allen's Postmaster for two years and rural mail carrier for 24 years. A World War II veteran, he served in the Philippine Campaign in Company B, 127th Infantry, 32nd Red Arrow Division. His very active community involvement included membership in the Allen American Legion Post #538.

He joined Knights of Pythias Allen Lodge #230 November 8, 1939 becoming a life member in 1989 and passing with 65½ years of membership. Bill went through all the chairs becoming Chancellor Commander

in 1954 & 1955 and was secretary and treasurer for many years. He was elected to Grand Outer Guard in 1964 and at Grand Lodge he continued through the chairs until he became Grand Chancellor in 1969-1970. He served on numerous committees in Grand Lodge and attended all the Grand Lodge sessions until his health prevented him from attending.

Brother Bill was the greatest ritualist Michigan has ever had. He knew the Pythian work so well that he could recite from memory every part in the book in all three ranks. He used to challenge anyone in the state, or any Lodge team, to compete against him and in every contest he won. Bill told me one night while going to visit a lodge to put on rank work that he learned the whole ritual by heart by studying it for 24 years on his mail route. He would put the book on his car seat and study it as he made his rounds. Besides knowing our ritual, he could do our memorial funeral service by heart and our burial service too. I've been a member for 57 years and have never seen anyone else that could do both books from cover to cover by memory. Brother Bill had the Degree of the Golden Spur bestowed on him by his Lodge. This is the highest honor a Pythian can receive and Brother Bill certainly deserved it.

He was on the Allen Village Council and served as President for a number of years. Another thing Bill was interested in was the "Keep Michigan Beautiful" program. In 1970 he was instrumental in setting up and getting funding for the Allen Community Park. He recalled it was like a jungle that had to be cleared of brush, trees and poison ivy (which he got several times). He was a member of the Allen Historical Society and was also named Hillsdale County Veteran of the Year in 1990.

Bill was married to Leila on November 21st, 1942 (that's almost 61½ years). To this union was born one son, William L. Todd, and one daughter, Pamela Sides, one grandson, Timothy Todd, and one granddaughter, Dawn Whitford. Dawn was a recipient of the Michigan Pythian Recreation Center Award Scholarship Fund while going to Kalamazoo College. His wife, children, grandchildren, relatives and friends, and especially his Pythian brothers will sadly miss Brother Bill. During the Pythian service Carol Forney sang "The Old Rugged Cross," and "Amazing Grace".



The suggestion made by the President was adopted. An application was made to Congress for a charter, and the Order of Knights of Pythias was the first American Order ever chartered by an Act of the Congress of the United States.

The flag of the country has an honored place at every meeting and the Holy Bible is the supreme Book of Law. The Order does not seek to shape any man's creed, but Pythianism is the practical application of religious and charitable principles to every day life. We have a heritage of which we are proud and our precepts and teachings lead men to higher ideals of life. We invite like minded men of good character to join us in making these ideals the dominant factor in modern living. Peace Through Understanding The Knights of Pythias is dedicated to the cause of universal peace and is pledged to the promotion of understanding among men of good will as the surest means of attaining it. We believe that any two men, believers in a Supreme Being, meeting in a spirit of good will in an honest effort to understand each other, can live together in peace and harmony. We seek those who agree with this belief to apply for membership in the Knights of Pythias and join us in an effort to reach...


Myself I did not do much as I was recuperating after a very bad fall. (A deck had collapsed and I fell nine feet onto my back. Ouch!)

Have you ever watched the Summer Olympic Games for Track and Field and wished that you were one of the athletes competing for a chance at a medal?

Every person participating will win an award, and whether it be a medal or ribbon, to them it was an accomplishment. Some of those who excel in their events even get to go overseas and participate in the International Special Olympics, like the one held in Ireland last year.

Each participant takes the following oath at the start of the games:

"LET ME WIN, BUT IF I CANNOT WIN, LET ME BE BRAVE IN THE ATTEMPT."

I am writing this article as one of the volunteers from Clark County Lodge #96 in Las Vegas, Nevada. I, along with 9 others had just worked at the Clark County Special Olympics Championships for track and field.

This was the first time that every school in the district, from elementary, middle school and high school participated alongside the handicapped children and adults, and as a result there were over 400 kids trying to win an award.

They truly believe in the oath they take. You have to be there in person to see how hard they try to win an event. They cheer, clap and yell for each other when they complete the event. Sometimes there is only 1 person competing and still you get the same reactions. By being there you can't help not feeling the emotion inside of you when these kids compete.

They not only do it in track and field, but basketball, bowling and swimming are part of the Olympics too. Each one is held at different times of the year.

Our lodge is a small lodge but very active. Special Olympics is one of our charities that we give money to and volunteer to work at the games. We are always there at all the different Olympic meets with our banner hanging alongside that of Special Olympics. Our Lodge is also "announced" at every meet, because we are appreciated by the Special Olympics of Nevada, and we love the kids, too!

You just melt when a kid who remembers you from previous games comes up to you and hugs you for coming to watch them again. If you've never volunteered to work at Special Olympics, you must do so. Once you have done it, you will be hooked on continuing to do so.


